# B211 / B511 / B711 - Through the Bible: Law and History Course Description & Syllabus

This Old Testament course covers the books of the law (Torah) and the books of Hebrew history. The student will learn many valuable lessons in spirituality, geography, chronology, canonicals, and law. This survey course is designed to give the student a general knowledge of and appreciation for the first half of the Old Testament. It begins with the creation in Genesis and ends with Israel's deliverance through God's use of Esther, all of which encompasses the legal foundation and history of the Jewish nation. It is from these writings that Christianity obtains the foundations of its own moral and civil laws. This course can be taken on an undergraduate level of study (B211 - toward a Bachelor degree), or it can be taken on a graduate level of study (B511/B711 - toward a Masters or Doctors degree), providing the course requirements are met as explained in this course syllabus.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

<u>ACADEMIC</u>---To enable the student to gain a basic knowledge of the first half of the Old Testament, including the order of the books contained in it.

<u>ATTITUDINAL</u>---To help the student understand the origins and history of the Jewish nation, and the principles involved in God's dealings with mankind.

<u>BEHAVIORAL</u>---To encourage the student to apply the principles of God's Word, as revealed in His laws and statutes, to his own daily walk of faith.

### B211 - (DIPLOMA - ASSOCIATE - BACHELOR) - 3 CREDIT - DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

- 5. Successful completion of the Mid-term (25%) and Final (25%) Examinations will constitute the remainder of your grades for the course.

### **B511 - (MASTERS) - 4 CREDIT - DEGREE REQUIREMENTS**

For students taking this course on a Master's level, the student must:

- 1. Maintain a minimum of a "B" average for the course.
- 2. Read all materials assigned.
- 3. Study the review materials.
- 4. Before taking the final examination, the student will submit a ten (10)- page essay on any topic pertaining to the subject studied in this course. This ten (10)-page essay includes a cover page & bibliography page. The essay is to be typed double spaced, in New Times Roman type font, 12 font size. The instructions for essay/assignment submission are as follows: Coursework may be electronically uploaded into the Online Student Portal (if taking the course as an Online Student); submitted to the overseeing Instructor (if taking the course as part of a Distance Learning (DLC) Center); or electronically emailed to <a href="mailto:Assignment@chesapeakebiblecollege.com">Assignment@chesapeakebiblecollege.com</a>. The essay will constitute one-half (50%) of your grade for the course.

This twenty (20)-page essay includes a cover page & bibliography page. The essay may be submitted as outlined in the B211 Degree Requirement and the Master's Degree descriptions above.
