B302 / B502 / B702 - The Life of Christ Course Description & Syllabus

This course is an in-depth study on the origins of the Gospels as related to the earthly life of Jesus Christ. It is designed to give the student an understanding of the pattern and example established for the conduct of the believer's own life as documented in Scripture. Varying theories as to the origin of the Gospels will be reviewed, as well as timelines to events found in the Synoptic Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke (which describe events from a similar point of view) as contrasted with that of the Gospel of John. This course can be taken at an undergraduate level of study (B302 - toward a Bachelor degree), or it can be taken on a graduate level of study (B502/B702 - towards a Masters or Doctors degree), providing the course requirements are met as explained in this course syllabus.

In forming the materials for this course, some textbooks used included THE THOMPSON CHAIN REFERENCE BIBLE, STALKER'S LIFE OF CHRIST and A HARMONY OF THE FOUR GOSPELS second edition by Orville E. Daniel. Stalker's Life of Christ closely follows the Harmony of the Gospels found in the Thompson Chain Reference Bible [ref# 4308a] A Harmony of the Four Gospels uses the NIV translation, but the Scripture references can be read from any translation.

Optional/Other recommended books to read are: A Harmony of the Gospels by A.T. Robertson [no longer in print], The Life of Christ Visualized by Dr. Ray E. Baughman [no longer in print] and A Short Life of Christ by Everett F. Harrison published by Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Company [still in print].

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

<u>ACADEMIC</u>---To enable the student to gain a basic knowledge into an in-depth study on the origins of the Gospels as related to the earthly life of Jesus Christ.

<u>ATTITUDINAL</u>---To help the student understand the varying theories, timelines, and events found in the Synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) and to those in the Gospel of John.

<u>BEHAVIORAL</u>---To help the student understand the pattern and example established for the conduct of the believer's own life as documented in Scripture.

COURSE GRADING:

- 2. Read all materials assigned.
- 3. Study the review materials.
- 4. The student will complete the lesson/chapter quizzes, (six (6) in total), that are associated with each section of the coursework. This will constitute one-quarter (25%) of your grade for the course.
- 5. Before taking the final examination, the student will submit a summary essay that compiles six (6) one-page summaries (one for each lesson/chapter) on what impacted you through your learning and how you may apply this principle today in the discipleship of others. This will constitute one-half (50%) of your grade for the course. Please type this summary essay noting Student Name, Course

Number & Course Title, and Date of Completion. This summary essay should be in Times New Roman font 12, double-spaced, include a course title page, and be submitted as outlined in the B302 Degree Requirement description above.

6. Successful completion of the Final Examination (25%) will constitute the remainder of your grade for the course.

B502 - (MASTERS) - 4 CREDIT - DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

For students taking this course on a Master's level, the student must:

- 1. Maintain a minimum of a "B" average for the course.
- 2. Read all materials assigned.
- 3. Study the review materials.
- 4. Before taking the final examination, the student will submit a ten (10)- page essay on any topic pertaining to the subject studied in this course. This ten (10)-page essay includes a cover page & bibliography page. The essay is to be typed double spaced, in New Times Roman type font, 12 font size. The instructions for essay/assignment submission are as follows: Coursework may be electronically uploaded into the Online Student Portal (if taking the course as an Online Student); submitted to the overseeing Instructor (if taking the course as part of a Distance Learning (DLC) Center); or electronically emailed to Assignment@chesapeakebiblecollege.com. The essay will constitute one-half (50%) of your grade for the course.
- 5. Successful completion of the Lesson/Chapter Quizzes (25%) and Final (25%) Examinations will constitute the remainder of your grades for the course.
