

B400 / B500 / B700 - The Book of Galatians and the Four Prison Epistles Course Description & Syllabus

This course represents a general study of Paul's letters to the Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon. It is designed to give the student an understanding of the meaning and purpose of each of these letters, as well as the principles contained in them as they relate to the Christian's walk of faith. The purpose of this course, besides laying a foundation in this part of the scriptures, is two-fold: 1) to obtain a thorough knowledge of the personal messages written by the apostle Paul to four of his newly-established churches in Asia; and 2) to receive encouragement, inspiration and correction in our daily walk in the Spirit. The last epistle to be studied in this course is a personal letter to a friend. This course can be taken at an undergraduate level of study (B400 - toward a Bachelor degree), or it can be taken on a graduate level of study (B500/B700 - towards a Masters or Doctors degree), providing the course requirements are met as explained in this course syllabus.

For the purposes of this course, you should read each epistle through at least twice, preferably in the King James or New King James Version. In addition, read the chapters pertaining to each session with the intent to not lose sight of what the Lord Jesus has taught us-namely, that He is the focus of all Scripture. Therefore, we need to see beyond the written word to Him who is the Living Word. We need to see Him and to get to know Him in such a way that we grow in both our love for, and trust in, Him.



COURSE OBJECTIVES:

<u>ACADEMIC</u>--- That the student acquires knowledge of the authorship, purpose and contents of the Book of Galatians along with the four epistles contained in this study.

<u>ATTITUDINAL</u>--- That the student acquires the desire to accept the truth of the principles contained within this study, as well as the desire to apply those principles to his own life.

<u>BEHAVIORAL</u>--- That the student use Paul's letters as a mirror with which to examine his own walk of faith and to make whatever changes are necessaly to become a vessel of honor.

COURSE GRADING:

Chesapeake Bible College and Seminary uses a four-point grading system to calculate both semester and cumulative grade point averages. Point grades for all quizzes, exams, projects, and/or papers in any given course will be averaged to determine the final letter grade for the course, as applicable.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

STUDY TEXT: COURSE TEXTS (required)

The Bible - Students should use a bona fide translation of the Bible (KJV, NKJV, NIV, etc.). Paraphrases of the Bible (The Living Bible, Good News Bible, The Message, etc.) should not be used, because they are not accurate translations.

B400 - (DIPLOMA - ASSOCIATE - BACHELOR) - 3 CREDIT - DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

For Students taking this course at an undergraduate level, (4) credit course, an additional six (6)-page essay is required to be submitted from any topic of choice in addition to the criteria below. This six (6)-page essay includes a cover page & bibliography page. The essay is to be typed double spaced, in New Times Roman type font, 12 font size. The instructions for essay/assignment submission are as follows: Coursework may be electronically uploaded into the Online Student Portal (if taking the course as an Online Student); submitted to the overseeing Instructor (if taking the course as part of a Distance Learning (DLC) Center); or electronically emailed to Assignment@chesapeakebiblecollege.com.

- 1. Maintain a minimum of a "C" average for the course.
- 2. Read all materials assigned.
- 3. Study the review materials.
- 4. The student will submit a one-page response essay (one paragraph for each theme from each book) as to how each book's theme is applied or relevant to your life and/or ministry today. This will constitute one-half (50%) of the student grade for the course. This response essay must have a course title page and may be submitted as outlined in the B400 Degree Requirement description above.
- 5. Successful completion of the Mid-term (25%) and Final (25%) Examinations will constitute the remainder of your grades for the course.

B500 - (MASTERS) - 4 CREDIT - DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

For students taking this course on a Master's level, the student must:

- 1. Maintain a minimum of a "B" average for the course.
- 2. Read all materials assigned.
- 3. Study the review materials.
- 4. Before taking the final examination, the student will submit a ten (10)- page essay on any topic pertaining to the subject studied in this course. This ten (10)-page essay includes a cover page & bibliography page. The essay is to be typed double spaced, in New Times Roman type font, 12 font size. The instructions for essay/assignment submission are as follows: Coursework may be electronically uploaded into the Online Student Portal (if taking the course as an Online Student); submitted to the overseeing Instructor (if taking the course as part of a Distance Learning (DLC) Center); or electronically emailed to Assignment@chesapeakebiblecollege.com. The essay will constitute one-half (50%) of your grade for the course.
- 5. Successful completion of the Mid-term (25%) and Final (25%) Examinations will constitute the remainder of your grades for the course.

B700 - (DOCTORS) - 4 CREDIT - DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

For students taking this course on a Doctorate level, the requirements are the same as the Master's degree (see above) except the student must write a twenty (20)-page essay, instead of a ten (10)- page essay. This twenty (20)-page essay includes a cover page & bibliography page. The essay may be submitted as outlined in the B500 Degree Requirement and the Master's Degree descriptions above.
