T301/ T521 / T721 The Defense of the Faith Course Description & Syllabus

This course is designed to present critical information and concepts of Christian apologetics – otherwise known as defending the faith. One's defense of the faith is a vital aspect for every believer as we are commanded in 1 Peter 3:15, "But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts, and always be ready to give a defense to everyone who asks you a reason for the hope that is in you, with meekness and fear." The purpose of this course is to arm you, the student, with sufficient information with which to strengthen your faith in the Rock of Ages. The Bible is reliable. You can trust your whole soul with it. This course can be taken on an undergraduate level of study (T521 - toward a Bachelor's degree), or it can be taken on a graduate level of study (T521/T721 - toward a Masters or Doctors degree), providing the course requirements are met as explained in this course syllabus.

OBJECTIVES:

<u>ACADEMIC</u>--- To provide the student with a basic knowledge and understanding of Christian apologetics.

<u>ATTITUDINAL</u>--- To help the student realize that one's faith is not simply a garment to be worn only at certain times, or on certain days; but that it is something that is to have a direct influence on his or her everyday life.

<u>BEHAVIORAL</u>--- To turn the student's firsthand knowledge of his faith into an effective instrument for the propagation of Christianity throughout the world.

T301 - (DIPLOMA - ASSOCIATE - BACHELOR) - 3 CREDIT - DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

For Students taking this course as an undergraduate, (4) credit course, an additional six (6)-page essay is required to be submitted on researching the basic differences between your faith, and at least one other example of a faith tradition, which contrasts your faith. This six (6)-page essay includes a cover page & bibliography page.

The essay is to be typed double spaced, in New Times Roman type font, 12 font size. The instructions for essay/assignment submission are as follows: Coursework may be electronically uploaded into the Online Student Portal (if taking the course as an Online Student); submitted to the overseeing Instructor (if taking the course as part of a Distance Learning (DLC) Center); or electronically emailed to Assignment@chesapeakebiblecollege.com.

- 1. Maintain a minimum of a "C" average for the course.
- 2. Read all materials assigned.
- 3. Study the review materials.
- 4. Before taking the final examination, the student will: Submit a minimum four-page defense of your faith essay which answers how you would defend that The Lord Jesus Christ is The Messiah. This will constitute one-half (50%) of your grade for the course. The essay submitted must have a course title page and may be submitted as outlined in the T301 Degree Requirement description above.
- 5. Successful completion of the Mid-term (25%) and Final (25%) examinations will constitute the remainder of your grades for the course.

T521 - (MASTERS) – 4 CREDIT - DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

For students taking this course on a master's level, the student must:

- 1. Maintain a minimum of a "B" average for the course.
- 2. Read all materials assigned.
- 3. Study the review materials.
- 4. Before taking the final examination, the student will: Submit a ten (10)- page research paper rich with Scriptures and references on any topic of choice from the course content or an essay on how and when you may have defended your faith practically as part of your faith journey. The student should list references used, including Bibles, Concordances, articles, books, etc. as the student contrasts examples and/or provides information for the need to accurately defend the Christian faith.

This ten (10)- page research paper should include a cover page with: Student name, address, phone number, email address, and date along with the name of overseeing instructor, the course/degree program (T301, T521, T721) and include a bibliography page at the end. The research essay is to be typed double spaced, in New Times Roman type font, 12 font size. The instructions for

essay/assignment submission are also outlined in the Assignment section of the online course and are as follows: The research paper should be electronically uploaded into the Online Student Portal (if taking the course as an Online Student); submitted to the overseeing Instructor (if taking the course as part of a Distance Learning (DLC) Center); or electronically emailed to Assignment@chesapeakebiblecollege.com. The research paper will constitute one-half (50%) of your grade for the course. Neatness, grammar, spelling, content, context, and bibliography will be considered.

5. Successful completion of the Mid-term (25%) and Final (25%) examinations will constitute the remainder of your grades for the course.

T721 - (DOCTORS) - 4 CREDIT - DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

For students taking this course on a Doctor's level, the requirements are the same as the master's degree (see above) except the student must write a twenty (20)-page essay, instead of a ten (10)- page essay. This twenty (20)-page essay includes a cover page & bibliography page. The essay may be submitted as outlined in the T521 Degree Requirement and the Master's degree descriptions above.
