The Book of Revelation

Course Description & Syllabus

Revelation is an unveiling of the future as directly revealed to John the Beloved from God through Jesus Christ by His angel.

This course will examine points of major interest in each chapter and will touch on some of the various positions of scholars as to the "unveiling" of "Christ's veiling." Great care will be taken to develop an understanding of the Holy Spirit's inspiration through His servant John concerning, "The things that were, things that are, and the things to come" (Rev. 1:19). For, "Blessed is he that breatheth, and they that hear the words of this prophecy, and keep those things which are written in it; for the time is at hand" (Rev.1:3).

In forming the materials for this course, both the King James Version and the New King James versions of the Bible have been used. Scripture references can also be read from any translation.



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COURSE OBJECTIVES:

ACADEMIC--- That students obtain a solid academic understanding of the contents of the book of Revelation, and its various interpretations as revealed by the Spirit of God to mankind.

ATTITUDINAL--- That students come to appreciate the sovereignty and ultimate victory of Jesus Christ and His Church over all of the works of Satan.

BEHAVIORAL--- That students become acutely aware of the movement of the Lord in world conditions around them; that they understand these happenings better by their study of Revelation; and that they are, as a result of this course, better able to help others understand events unfolding in the world, the Middle East and in Israel, especially, that they would live as though Christ's return is imminent.

COURSE GRADING:

B-530 - (MASTERS) – 4 CREDIT - DEGREE REQUIREMENTS
